

NBUMC is a qualified charitable organization (a 501(c)3). Through the church, members are able to make charitable contributions to local, national and global organization via additional donations. Don't want to get on another mailing list, but want to donate? Designate the organization and give through NBUMC. NBUMC then aggregates the donations and sends them out. Gift cards, and organization descriptions, are available. Watch the *Weekly Email* for further information.

We support 5 Local organizations:

<u>Bethesda Cares</u>: works to prevent homelessness through programs supporting people in danger of eviction/utility shut-off in Montgomery County, and having other needs.

<u>Bethesda Help</u>: supplies food to needy families in Montgomery County. Their pantry is housed at NBUMC. <u>Capital Area Food Bank</u>: supplies food to needy families in the Washington region.

Cornerstone Montgomery: empowers people living with mental health and substance use disorders.

Primary Care for Kids: affordable healthcare children of low-income families in Montgomery County.

We support 3 National organizations:

<u>Bread for the World</u>: lobbies Congress for support of programs to feed the hungry in the US and globally. <u>Henderson Settlement, Kentucky</u>: supports poor and abused families in Appalachia.

Intermountain Children's Home, Montana: cares for abused children and families from the US.

We support 6 Global organizations:

AHEAD Inc. (Adventures in Health, Education, and Agricultural Development): Founded by NBUMC members Irving and Elvira Williams; supports education and health programs in rural Tanzania and Gambia.

<u>French Medical Institute for Mothers and Children, Afghanistan</u>: Founded by the French and Afghan Governments, the Aga Khan University, and the French NGO, La Chaine de l'Espoir; provides world-class healthcare to Afghan families at a hospital in Kabul. The governing board is chaired by NBUMC member, Lee Hilling.

<u>Institute of Grace, Haiti:</u> provides education, healthcare and meals for poor families in Haiti.

<u>Samata Sarana, Clarendon Foundation, California</u>: supports the homeless and hungry in Sri Lanka.

Samburu School, Kenya: support for the education and meals for poor rural children in the Samburu region. (Dr. Janet Jalloul; contact Jacqui Cragg)

I AM ZIMBABWE: our very own Tsitsi Sithole is on the leadership team of this wonderful organization in Zimbabwe that works to nurture, educate and empower a community of safe and healthy children, youth and older adults.

Finance Committee Update

At the end of September 2023, NBUMC 's YTD 2023 budget has a surplus of \$16,225. Revenue for January - September was \$299,069. This includes \$183,516 from Pledges & Identified Offerings and \$20,573 in rental fees from Other Building Use. Expenditures for this period was \$282,844. We've paid 100% of our Mission Shares to the Baltimore-Washington Conference.

NBUMC's planned financial budget for 2023 is \$419.043.

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MESSAGES FROM THE PASTOR

November/December Worship Highlights

Whether or not we are ready for it, we've come once again to the "turning of the year," as Christ the King Sunday on November 26th is the last Sunday in our liturgical calendar, and a new year begins with the contemplative and preparatory season of Advent. We're trying something new this year for Christ the King Sunday: a service called the "Celebration of the Christian Year," which is intended to help us understand and find more spiritual meaning in the liturgical seasons of Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, Pentecost, and Ordinary Time. Our service will take us on a whirlwind tour of the whole year, including short teachings and readings, a favorite hymn from each season, and an explanation of the colors and symbols connected to it.

It will be a fun service, with participation from our Arts Committee (and anyone else who wants to do a reading.) Thanks to Rev. Angela Wells for the idea and worship resource.

Our guiding theme for this Advent is "God's Grand Entrance." The lectionary readings assigned for each Sunday invite us to consider the tension between the ways we expect God to arrive, and the reality of God's chosen vulnerability. We will hear from the prophets, recall the stories of some of our favorite Advent and Christmas characters, and allow for the possibility that Christ is continuing to be born in our world in unexpected ways, even today. Our choir will lead us in a service of Lessons & Carols on December 17th, with special guest musicians and music that brings the challenging and hopeful words of the prophets to life. On December 24th our Brunch Church will be an opportunity to experience the radical love of a God who saw our hunger, came in person to feed, heal, and restore us, and who surprises us with grace every time we gather at a table in community.

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Church News: From the Board

The NBUMC Board hosted a "town hall" meeting on October 29th to share with our congregation the work that has been accomplished in 2023, and the plans underway for 2024—all in preparation for Stewardship Sunday on November 5th.

Some of the accomplishments we listed include:

- re-designing our visitor bags and adding contact cards to the pews to welcome our visitors
- installing a new security camera system using a \$12,000 grant from Montgomery County
- replacing the office computer
- transitioning to web-based church management software
- moving excess general funds to high-yield accounts
- initiated building a new church website

If you have talents in any of these areas, please let me know.



Rev Kara led the discussion around our ministry in 2023 by focusing on how we Worship, Nurture, and Serve. Each of the staff and committee chairs shared highlights from 2023 and some plans for 2024. There were so many wonderful highlights (far too many to list) the joy was overflowing!

A significant part of the Board's work is centered around our staff. In addition to working with and supporting Rev. Kara, we acknowledged that in the past 12 months we welcomed Simon Charette as Director of Music, Gwendolyn Daniels as Office Manager, Tsitsi Sithole as Director of Children's Ministries, and Grace Thompson as Prime Time Assistant. And, we applauded the ongoing work of Linda Thompson as Minister of Visitation. We hope to add a shared Youth Minister very soon.

Our building is the center and sign of our ministry, and it is also an important source of revenue. Taking care of its aging bones and plumbing takes a great deal of attention and resources. We are taking steps to identify the maintenance and upkeep priorities. We are also forming a building and grounds committee to help address the building's needs. Please contact me if you can serve.

For 2024, we announced exciting plans to host a 2024 Community Concert Series in memory of Valerie Blane. Three events are scheduled:

- February 25th: **Greg Zelek**, 31, Principal Organist of the Madison Symphony Orchestra will offer a concert co-sponsored by Allen Organ Company
- June 2nd: Vocalist **Rochelle Rice** will bring her program **And We Shall March** about the Civil Rights March of 1963
- September 28th: We will host two ensembles of the Gay Men's Chorus of Washington, **D.C. Rock Creek**Singers, a 32-voice chamber ensemble, and **Potomac Fever**, a 16-voice contemporary a capella group

In 2024, the Board agreed to a theme of "Deep Listening." Much of what we talked about in our planning revolved around listening to each other, to the community, to our members and ultimately God—through prayer, study, conversation, and outreach. We hope you will join us as we work on sharpening our listening skills and behavior.



Blessing of the Animals!


NBUMC held it's annual "Blessing of the Animals," hosted by the Arts Committee, on Sunday, October 22, 2023.



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Service and Outreach

RENTAL ASSISTANCE FOR AFGHAN FAMILY

During worship on October 29th, we were challenged to join together as a congregation to raise money for an Afghan refugee family connected with Merwyn and Kirstin DeMello, who preached and shared with us in May. This family has sought asylum, is living in Baltimore, and is in need of money to help cover their rent until their U.S. work permits come through this spring. We are working through the New Neighbors Interfaith Alliance (NNIA) to support them. We brought forward post-it notes, with each color corresponding to a dollar amount, and used them to fill in a picture of a house. When the house was completed, our goal of \$3,400 was reached. We ended up adding several "additions" to the house, and surpassed our goal by more than \$1,000! We are delighted to be able to offer the Nawroozi family enough money for five months' rent, which will hopefully bridge the gap until they are able to be employed. Thank you for your enthusiastic generosity!

A Heartfelt Thank You from the Samburu Children

This sweet note arrived from Kenya to thank NBUMC for a "Gifts of Caring" donation of \$300 that provided badly needed food for the children and families of the Samburu School at a difficult time of drought and inflation in Kenya. The original is posted on the bulletin board together with other tokens from the school.

From an email from Janet Jalloul, who built and runs the school: "We now have 200 children in nursery through primary 6 classes. We also have a clinic with a nurse on the school site and offer a hot lunch every day. The age range of the students is five years to fifteen as some start school late. We also give the students uniforms and shoes because many do not have."

Recent donations from NBUMC have helped buy sewing and building materials, sports equipment, and additional textbooks. Thank you to all at NBUMC who have supported Samburu School over the years. We look forward to seeing what will happen next at this place where so much is done with modest contributions. And please remember Samburu when our Gifts of Caring campaign begins soon!

Symbols in Chancel Window Explain Why Christ Matters

At least 13 sermons have been preached over the years on the stained glass window installed in our sanctuary chancel in 1965. Henry Lee Willet, son of the American church stained-glass window pioneer, William Willet, designed the window especially for North Bethesda. Summed up in the window's title, "Tree of Life," the symbols embedded within it together explain why Jesus Christ matters. At left is a drawing of the entire window including each of its symbols by Lillieanna Beck, longtime member of our church.

Starting from the bottom of the window, the first symbol is a human foot encircled by a snake. Referencing Genesis 3, it anticipates the coming of Christ by showing that we are doomed without God's saving grace. In effect, Jesus takes the place of the garden of Eden's tree of life, with its forbidden fruit. Continuing up the window, the manger symbolizes Christ's humble birth, described in Luke 2:1-7, as an act of reconciliation. Above it are the letters "X" and "P," for the Greek symbols Chi and Rho for "Jesus Christ," joined to the Star of Bethlehem, signifying that Jesus is the light of the world.

In the third panel, we see a scallop shell with three drops of water. Together, they represent the baptism of Jesus, described in Matthew 3:13-17, and the baptism of all Christians into a life of fulfillment in Christ. On the same panel are two fish, referencing Mark 1:16-20, in which Jesus bids his future disciples, some humble fishermen, to follow him. This task calls to mind the real task of Christian discipleship. We learn what discipleship means in the fourth panel, symbolizing the Sermon on the Mount with the letters "X" and "P" rising over a stylized mountain. As described in Matthew 5:1-12 and Matthew 5:43-48, Jesus proclaims a message of hope and fulfillment to all who show mercy, loving even their enemies.

The chariot of fire that carried the prophet Elijah up by a whirlwind into Heaven, II Kings 2:9-11, is symbolized in the middle panel. Mr. Willet chose this symbol to show how Jesus fulfills the work of the prophets and the Law. Like Jesus, who appeared in glory before the disciples, accompanied by Elijah and Moses in Luke 9:28-36, we too are called upon to transcend meaninglessness and death by living lives in Christ's light. The Last Supper is symbolized in the panel above with bread representing the Body of Christ in a chalice below a strand of wheat. It reminds us that we come to Christ for nourishment so that we may go out to serve a needy world (Luke 22:1-23).


In the panel above, a cross behind nails and a crown of thorns symbolize the passion of Christ. In his final days in human form, Jesus accepted every degrading gesture and act of a humankind that rejected his invitation to live as God's people. Suffered by God so that we may be healed, Jesus' death on the cross is God's ultimate act of reconciliation (Matthew 26:57-68; 27:11-50).

The top quadrant symbolizes the resurrection of Christ with an empty tomb from which emerges a banner of victory over sin and death (Luke 24). It signifies that God's spirit remains alive in the world, available to all who receive it.

The chancel window comes to a point with a crown, stars and palms, symbolizing Christ enthroned in glory at the right hand of God (Ephesians 1:16-23). So, too, does the Tree of Life come to a point—with everything converging upon God.
