I greet you in this New Year with a sense of both grief and anticipation. Grief that I am leaving you at the end of June, and anticipating new things for you in this new year and new time, under the direction of a new pastor.

The process for selecting a new pastor involves a couple of steps you may not be familiar with since NBUMC has had the luxury of more lengthy

appointments than most UMC churches. The decision is made by the Bishop in consultation with the 8 District Superintendents (DS). They use the church profile prepared by NBUMC's Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC). The SPRC has interviewed 30 members and leaders of our church to determine some of the skills and concerns that the church has in describing what is hoped for in a pastor. Each District Superintendent will have a copy of the Profile. They will follow our DS Rev. Gerry Green's guidance in selecting the best candidate for our church, based on that description and who is actually available for an appointment this summer. That pastor will be asked if he/she is willing to serve at NBUMC. When the confirmation between the DS and the pastor is achieved, the new pastor will be introduced to our SPRC.

This process will take some time, so please be patient. The Cabinet and Bishop start with a review of all 600+ churches at their retreat at the end of January. They look at all the forms the churches complete annually about their pastoral assignment. Prioritizing the churches that have a natural vacancy, such as a pastor retiring, each DS will nominate someone they know whom they feel fits NBUMC's profile. They then discuss the various pastors to determine who should be asked to serve. Rev. Green will call the pastor so designated to ask if they are willing to serve NBUMC. The person selected is given time to pray and reflect about the assignment. When agreement is reached, DS Green will call Flora Milans, our chair of SPRC, to set up a meeting with the SPRC to meet the newly-considered pastor, and then begin the transition process for the July 1st assignment to NBUMC.

We hope to know something in March, but that is not up to us.

As you may know, I am retired as of January 1, 2021, in part, to allow for a reduction in salary for NBUMC to ease the financial burden. The new pastor will have a lower salary. In order to provide a smooth transition, I am not leaving NBUMC until the end of June. Retirement allows me to collect a pension and social security thus greatly reducing the salary obligations on NBUMC. I will receive a smaller salary from NBUMC to make up the difference between my retirement income and my current salary.

I am sad about leaving, I would love to spend several more years here, but the pandemic has made all of us review our plans. I am anticipating a fresh perspective from your new pastor, and potential for new and exciting ministries going forward. I will receive a small church, retired appointment to begin July 1. I won't know where for a while, either.

I urge you, above all things, to spend a lot of time praying for the Holy Spirit to guide this process. Pray for the Bishop, the DS's and for the new pastor. Pray for NBUMC to be prepared to welcome new leadership this summer.

I am truly thankful for all your love and support in these seven years we've been here. I am truly grateful for the awesome level of leadership you all have provided to me in this time as well. I just hope we have a time near the end to have a physical gathering for a farewell.

Bishop Easterling's Statement on Capitol Violence

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through him all things were made; without him, nothing was made that has been made. In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. -- John 1:1-5

The light of Epiphany rose with the sun this morning as people of faith celebrated the culmination of Christmastide. That light was met with darkness as a mob pushed past police and broke into the U.S. Capitol while senators and members of Congress debated the certification of the presidential election. As the scene unfolded, most could not comprehend that this insurrection is taking place in the United States of America.

It is tempting to call for peace, for order and unity. And while we do need to reclaim the peace, we can only do so while speaking the truth of today's horror. It is time to name our reality, to name the deep divisions and hatred being played out in the Senate chamber and throughout the People's House. It is another watershed moment; a time to raise our voices to heaven and take stock of who we, as Americans, have become.

This alarming occupation and violence at the U.S. Capitol are symptomatic of the vitriol and poison that now infects our culture. It disheartens. The rioters who climbed the steps and walls of the Capitol sought to overturn the law, a fair election, and justice, and claimed their motivation was to defend God and their freedoms. They waved banners emblazoned with the words, "Jesus Saves," but this is not what Emmanuel came to earth to embody. This is a perversion of the Gospel. This should drive all of us to our knees.

Since March, I have shared messages with you as we live through this liminal time of two pandemics. Today, the chasm of this in-between time grows deeper. As a church, we are called to profound and fervent prayer - prayer that will shake foundations and usher in a new age; prayer that will transform hearts and a nation; prayer that reminds us of what Christ has called us to be beyond partisan divides. I call on each of you to transcend fear and to resist the temptation to seek the reassurance of easy answers. Followers of Jesus Christ must prophetically embody, in word and deed, the precepts, practices and promises of the Gospel message. It is a message of love, but a love that speaks truth and stands against immorality.

As a church, as Christians, we must condemn all the forces that led to the unprecedented insurrection today - forces of hate, of white supremacy, of distorted self-interest, and abuse of power.

Lawmakers and national leaders are all invoking the name of God, asking that God bless America. That is my prayer as well. But, we must be instruments of that blessing, humbling ourselves to truly claim what Abraham Lincoln called, "the better angels of our nature," seeking to discern how to rebuild our nation and nurture the restoration that God demands. In this light, we continue to pray for and support the peaceful transfer of power that is a hallmark of the democratic process.

In my study, the word HOPE sits on my shelf. It's a word I claim. It is a primary foundation of our faith. I will not allow the actions of an angry mob to steal that hope for our nation, for our church, for our future. Our hope, if it is to be manifest, must be grounded in courage, in justice, in good order, and in fervent love. Our hope proclaims that our light shines in the darkness, and the darkness shall not overcome it - must not overcome it.



Shrove Tuesday February 16: Pancakes and Talent (Pandemic Style)



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Mel Thompson: Living Legacy

Our beloved Mel Thompson recently moved to Bright View Senior Care Living around the corner from the home he and Linda have lived in for many years. His eyes are as bright as the brilliant blue sky of his native Michigan, and the twinkle in those eyes registers his wry humor and a spark of mischief. But he has lost his bearings, in memory and in daily life. Linda, visiting nurses, and friends could no longer guarantee Mel's safety at home. At Bright View, in safe surroundings, he may regain some of those memories.



And what memories they are! Mel's quiet demeanor at NBUMC gives no clue of his life-long involvement with the 4-H Clubs (now International 4-H) in Michigan and later in the national

Lansing Journal newspaper tracked Mel's idealistic career from its early days. Mel was born in 1933 in Ravenna, Michigan, his home until he moved to Arlington, Virginia many years later. As a teenager he became a very active 4-H club member participating in county, state, and national 4-H activities, and for five years he was a Junior 4-H Leader. In 1949 he attended the National 4-H Congress and in 1952 he represented Michigan at the National 4-H Camp in Washington, D.C. By then, he was attending the Michigan State University, on a four-year 4-H scholarship and other scholarships. By 1955, he had earned a B.A. degree, and he later earned an M.A. degree from American University. During those years, in 1953 he was selected to serve as a 4-H Fellow. Michigan 4-H sent Mel to Turkey for a long summer as an International Farm Youth Exchange (IFYE) delegate. In 1956-1958 Mel spent two years on the staff of the IFYE in Washington, D.C. During this time, Mel earned a Master's degree at American University. Back in Michigan, in 1960, already a County Extension Agent working with the Monroe County 4-H, he was appointed to the Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service.

In 1963, Mel and Linda married and relocated to Arlington, VA, where Mel served as a recruiter for the Peace Corps. In 1964 he and Linda moved to Nigeria for two years while Mel served as West Africa Director for

the newly established Peace Corps volunteer program Community Development and Agriculture.

During a long career with 4-H, Mel rose to become editor of the International Four-H Youth Exchange Association (IFYE) and a member of the IFYE Board of Directors. He is a member of the National 4-H History Preservation Leadership Team.

Mel's life of service to the 4-H ideals, and to national and international 4-H youth development, is the anchor of a whole-family dedication to service. Dawn spent 22 years as a teacher before relocating back to Maryland with her family in 2019. She is now serving as the Youth and Children's Director at Chevy Chase UMC. Dean is a U.S. State Department Foreign Service officer, serving at posts around the world.

Everyone here at NBUMC knows Linda as our Minister of Visitation. She is everywhere, doing everything, and helping many in need. Less well known is Mel's contribution as an early leader in the life of NBUMC. He chaired the Missions Commission (now the Social Action and Outreach Committee) and headed up the Rummage Sale of those days. He also served on the West District Council for several years.

Mel's health has been in decline for a long time. Regular church service attendees remember occasions in recent years when the Rescue Squad arrived quietly and gently whisked Mel away to Suburban Hospital. Each time, doctors were stumped by Mel's dangerously low blood pressure, and batteries of tests could not find a cause. During those years, Mel's memory was slowly dimming, and he was less and less steady on his feet. Linda and their children, Dawn and Dean, moved heaven and earth to keep him at home, but finally it was
